The Post 770 firing squad rendered Military honors following a memorial service at the Church of Epiphany.

**John Grove:** Passed away at his home at Fort Walton Beach, Florida on December 17, 2008. Although much of his time was spent in Florida, it was not unusual to receive a telephone call or letter asking if we could use some Post 770 shirts or jackets. Perhaps we might have need of a used stove or refrigerator delivered on his next trip up north? I felt this year might have been a good time to stop at Fort Walter Beach on our way home from our annual trip to Florida. John had always promised to show me around the Air Force Base. The unexpected news of his passing was announced at our December Post meeting. At that time a letter was read that should be shared with all of the membership.

**Local Humanitarian John Grove Dies:** Kimberly White, Fort Walton Beach, December 19, 2008

For more than two decades, retired Air Force Maj. John Grove worked tirelessly on humanitarian missions, including delivering food and medical supplies to Southeast Asian countries and helping to set up a fresh-water system in a Thai village. Grove, described by longtime friends as a “humanitarian hero,” died this week at his home at the age of 66. An autopsy is pending, but the cause of death is believed to be heart failure. Dave Freeman, a retired Air Force helicopter pilot, said he and Grove belonged to the same squadron and worked on various aid projects in recent years. Grove flew special ops in Thailand during the Vietnam War, where he received a Distinguished Flying Cross, “and the Air Commandos recognized the need to help people in the different countries in Southeast Asia.” Freeman said. The McCoskrie/Threshold Foundation, the nonprofit, humanitarian branch of the Air Commando Association, was born out of that need. Grove served most recently as its vice president. Freeman said Grove was an environmentalist as well a humanitarian. He said Grove “loved the environmental aspect of what he did. He was saving all of that stuff from just going to waste.” Lon Lancaster, a longtime friend who also worked with Grove on foundation projects, described him as “the humanitarian hero in the local area.” “I suspect that many in the local area would say that John Grove was one of (if not the) most prolific humanitarian workers in the Fort Walton Beach area for the past 20 years,” Lancaster wrote in an e-mail. Starting in the mid- 1980’s, Grove worked to improve the lives of others and of future generations. The projects included helping to ship hundred of donated school desks, dental equipment, and clothing from the United States to countries such as Honduras, Guatemala, Vietnam, and Laos. Most recently, he solicited donations of electric stoves, refrigerators, washers and other items to give to orphanages in Honduras as part of the foundations 16<sup>th</sup> annual Christmas Wish program. The Fort Walton Beach resident also coordinated charitable efforts closer to home. He delivered donated baked goods, medical supplies and other items to nursing homes and community organizations. “He was just a great member of the community,” Freeman said, “He went out to Krispy Kreme in Destin and they would give him all the doughnuts they weren’t going to sell, so he always had doughnuts and gave them out wherever he went.” Grove is survived by his mother, three brothers, and two children. He will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.

## DID YOU KNOW?

**Legion Launches VetCam for Families of Military, Vets: No software downloads needed, Indianapolis Dec 5, 2008**  
Military troops deployed overseas can now use their webcams to talk with their families back home without having to download software packages that might not pass muster with command cybernet security requirements. The American Legion has launched "VetCam", a free webcam service that enables US military service members and veterans to talk face-to-face on their personal computers with friends and family by simply registering as a user. Once registered, each user can connect with two webcams and use the service 24/7 from anyplace with an Internet connection. "webcam technology has been around for a while, but many required downloading software to make them work," said David Rehbein, National Commander of the American Legion. "We want our troops, our veterans, and their families to be able to enjoy the pleasure of talking face to face with their loved ones anywhere in the world, with just a couple of mouse clicks. Next to actually being there, seeing and talking with your spouse and kids, mom and dad and best friends are morale boosters prior generations of veterans never had." To initiate the service, a user will need a webcam or a computer

with a built in webcam. Then just go to [www.legion.org](http://www.legion.org), click on VetCams, register and start communicating. Once registered, simply log in at any time to connect. All members of the United States Armed Forces (active duty, Reserve and National Guard), members of the American Legion, their families and friends are welcome to use this complimentary technology.

**Operation Comfort Warriors: Meet the Challenge: NYALPA, Dec 2008**

We need your help. Most importantly they need you. They are our warriors, our guardians, or our protectors. They are liberators, peacekeepers and nation-builders. Or a gripping novel that provides a welcome distraction from PTSD? When the Red Cross notified the American Legion that zip-up sweatshirts were in short supply at Walter Reed, the Legion immediately ordered 100 sets. But it's just a drop in the bucket. Consider that there are 67 other US military inpatient facilities and 1,369 VA inpatient and outpatient centers, and you can grasp the enormous need. Their size and needs, however, are dwarfed by the obligation that America has to these heroes. The American Legion family is calling this effort Operation Comfort Warriors. Many centers are not equipped to store large quantities of care packages; so monetary donations are needed in order to purchase items that are truly needed. Faithful to their country, their comrades in arms and their loved ones back home. Operation Comfort Warrior will never be able to compensate these heroes for their sacrifices.
