"OLD GLORY"

- The name "Old Glory" was given to our national flag on Aug 10, 1831.
- The flag was first carried into battle on Sept 11, 1777 at Brandywine.
- On Aug 3, 1949, President Harry S Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th as Flag Day.
- The red stripes symbolize hardiness and valor, the white stripes symbolize purity and innocence, blue symbolizes vigilance, perseverance, and justice, and the stars symbolize the rays of light emanating from the sun.
- President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed an Executive Order on Aug 21, 1959 that established the current arrangement of the stars on the flag.

- Betsy Ross is reported to have designed and sewn the first American flag, but official records have not confirmed that she actually was responsible for the design and making of the first flag.

FRONTENAC AMERICAN FLAG

Dark smoke drifting skyward and the rhythm of throbbing engines reverberating across Cayuga Lake are the sights and sounds of a forgotten era. Steamboating on Cayuga provided reliable transportation, as well as entertainment for surrounding inhabitants, lasting almost a century. However, this great era came to a tragic end following the burning of the steamboat, Frontenac. On March 26, 1874, the Frontenac made its maiden journey on Cayuga Lake. From that first day until the fateful Saturday of July 27, 1907, this steamboat was a brilliant presence upon the waters of Cayuga. The Frontenac brought passengers to and from their destinations along the lake, all the while boasting an enormous American flag raised high above the stern. Struggling northward in a heavy wind on the 27th of July 1907, a small boy first spotted the flames along the deck of the Frontenac and reported them to Captain M.P. Brown. After a failed attempt at extinguishing the fire, Capt Brown ordered the boat to be run ashore. For an estimated 70 passengers that day, there were 400 life preservers available. Despite this, passengers who jumped off board with or without life preservers were forced to fight the strong current from the chugging engine. Eight people drowned, including a four-year old boy with his mother from Freeville and a ten-year old girl from Trumansburg. Many heroic efforts by the crew of the boat saved the lives of countless other women and children. For 33 years the American flag waving in the winds above the Frontenac witnessed many things. However, none would compare to the event that took place on that summer day in 1907. This flag, possibly even rescued from the burning vessel, is a reminder not only of the legendary Frontenac, but also the ending of one of Cayuga Lake's greatest periods in history.

The DeWitt Historical Society is home to his flag as well as several other items rescued from the Frontenac.
