A BIT OF HISTORY – LIBERTY SHIPS

Thanks Chris Vann, SAL member and friend for dropping off the History Channel Magazine for me to read. The article about "Hero Ships" is of particular interest to me. "The murky dawn of June 6th, 1944 revealed an armada off the coast of France such as the world had never seen. More than 5,000 ships were gathered for the D-Day invasion. They ranged in size from ocean liners to fishing boats. A German officer manning the Normandy defenses reacted with awe and disbelief. "It's impossible...there can't be that many ships in the world!" Fifty years later, elaborate celebrations

were held to mark the golden anniversary of D-Day. Out of that vast fleet, only a single ship was able to return to Normandy for the occasion. It wasn't a battleship or a destroyer, or one of the ubiquitous "Higgins Boats" that hit the beaches. The ship that returned was the SS Jeremiah O'Brien, a cargo vessel of type known as a Liberty Ship. It was, in a sense, fitting that a Liberty ship should have the stage to itself. The Liberties were unsung heroes of World War II. Faced with a critical shortage of cargo ships, the US responded with what might be the largest industrial program ever designed. It turned out an astonishing 2,710 Liberty ships in just three years. They carried planes, tanks, landing crafts, ammunitions, food, fuel, and other vital materials all around the globe. President Franklin Roosevelt once called them "ugly ducklings", but it would have been just about impossible to win the war effort without them. The last Liberty rolled into the water in the summer of 1944. Most were mothballed after the war and eventually scrapped. At one time anyone making the journey along the Hudson River near West Point would have noticed the large number of Liberty ships lying at anchor. Today they just about have all disappeared. Only two remain. One is Jeremiah O'Brien. Launched in Portland, Maine in 1943, the O'Brien carried supplies all over the globe, but it's most notable service was in support of the D-Day invasion. The ship made 11 trips from England to Omaha and Utah beaches. The reason these ships were of so much interest to me was that my Uncle was superintendent of transportation of materials at the Bethlehem Fairfield shipyard near Baltimore, MD. It was his job to get the building materials to the construction site. On one occasion he arranged for my father and I to attend a launching of one of the Liberty ships. I remember how thrilled I was to be beneath the bow of the ship where the welders cut the steel plates with their torches to allow the ship to slide down into the water. During this time the champagne bottle swung overhead from the christening. The ship had barely reached the water when the next crew began laying a new keel. It was certainly a thrill to see a ship launching.
